Detroit News Staff Writer A replacement is en route for Detroit's one-ship submarine fleet.

It is the USS Piper (409), which left New London, Conn., Friday to be towed through the St. Lawrence Seaway to a berth at the Brodhead Naval Armory here.

Lt. Commander Robert A. Villenave, in charge of training Detroit area submarine reservists, said arrival is expected July 14.

THE PIPER, equipped with snorkel-type breathing intakes for continuous submerged operations, will replace the USS Cero, an older type which lacked such sophisticated gear.

Cero, based at Brodhead for the last eight years, is to be decommissioned from naval service and donated to the National Museum of Transportation at St. Louis.

Her last duty is expected to be filled Sunday as a floating stage for television crews during the International Free-dom Festival hydroplane races in the Detroit River.

Piper, built at the Forts-mouth, N.H., naval shipyard in 1944, carried out three action-packed patrols around Japan in the last year of World War II.

# **5** Radium Needles Found; 10 Still Lost

NEW YORK-(AP)-Five of 15 dangerous radium needles lost in a transcontinental shipment have been recovered in San Diego and New York, a city health official said Saturday. Hanson Blatz, director of the health department's office of

radiation control, said four of the needles, which can cause severe radiation burns if handled, were recovered at the San Diego depot from which they were shipped to New York.

A crew from the office of radiation control here, using a Geiger counter, turned up the fifth needle shortly before 10 a.m. Saturday near the office of the Radium Chemical Co. Inc., final destination of the chipment. Each platinum needle is three-quarters of an inch long,

one-sixteenth of an inch thick and contains 100 milligrams of

radium for treating cancer. Dr. Brown said the lid of the lead shipping container had apparently not been wired tightly.
